Ruby took action when she was walking through a crowd of lots of angry people. She was the first black person to go to a white school. She was ordered to go to an all-white school in 1960 in New Orleans. Two people from the government told Ruby to go to Franz Elementary School.

I think that Ruby demonstrated bravery when she was walking through the crowd of lots and lots of people and totally calm and relaxed. I can't imagine doing that and being so calm.





Persevered

All of the other kids in her class left because of her skin color. She was alone with her teacher and kept on going to school.

Impact: How Things are Different Today

Because of Ruby black and white children can go to school together now. In 1960 a judge ordered four black girls to go to a white school. This was when the law changed.

I think that Ruby made an impact on how things are today because she was one of the girls that got sent to another school. Jackie Robinson, Martin Luther King Jr, Satchel Page also fought for equal rights.

When all of the other kids in her class left it was only her and her teacher and she and took it as an opportunity to learn!


I think that Ruby must have felt scared even though she was brave and I would have felt sad and worried if there were no other kids in my class. Ruby was also very confident and brave.

I think that Ruby communicated and shared by going to court to see if she could go to the white school.






Author Talk
